ACTIVITY AREA 1: COACHING AND GAMES DEVELOPMENT

In five years time, we will be able to say:

"Our underage section is one of the best. We have achieved excellence in coaching standards and in providing games for our young players in a safe and enjoyable environment. Our Club's adult teams perform to their full potential because we have the best possible coaching and games development structures in place."

Key Projects:

Coaching and Games Development Sub-Committee: We will appoint a Coaching and Games Development Sub-Committee to oversee all aspects of games development in the Club. This will include identifying new coaches in the community, encouraging parents to become involved in coaching and ensuring that all our Clubs coaches have GAA Coach Education qualifications. The committee will also ensure that a balanced programme of games is in place and that all players get an opportunity to play and participate. This Chairman of this committee will sit on the Club Executive Committee and will provide a report to each meeting.

Club Coaching Officer: We will appoint a Club Coaching Officer, who will be chairman of the Coaching and Games Sub-committee. He/she will have responsibility for managing the affairs of the committee and for overseeing all coaching and games related activities and policies.

Underage Games Programme: We will put in place a programme of games for all players involving Go-Games and Super Touch Blitzes within the Club and with other Clubs. This will ensure that all players get meaningful activity in an environment that promotes skill development.

Coach Education: We will put in place a programme that makes sure that every player is coached by a person qualified to the appropriate level. All Club coaches will receive GAA coach education qualifications. Each coach will have a minimum of a Foundation Award coaching certificate. We will aim to have all coaches at Award 1 level over time. We will also identify new referees, who will receive referee education and assistance from the County Board.

GAA Code of Best Practice and Code of Behaviour: We will put in place the GAA Code of Best Practice and Code of Behaviour. Everyone in the Club will show due respect to each other, to Club officers, to team mentors and to the match officials. We will ensure that all our volunteers working with children are Garda vetted and that our children participate in a safe environment.

Club/School Link: We will develop close links with our local primary and second level schools. We will provide support and advice to the schools in promoting our games.

11. GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Alcohol and Substance Abuse Programme (ASAP): GAA programme that focuses on minimising the harm being caused by alcohol and drugs in society.

Award 1: Coach education programme that qualifies the participant to be a lead coach for either child, youth or adult players.

Club School Link: Club support for local primary schools to ensure promotion of the Club and the games **Cúl Camps:** An organised camp for children aged between seven and 13. They are run by qualified coaches and usually held during the summer.

Go Games: Small sided skill development games for under 12's that focus solely on skill development and participation

'Have-a-go day': A series of football and hurling recreational blitzes held for individuals or groups who have had little or no involvement in the GAA previously. These are held at Club locations for newcomer or non-traditional communities.

Introductory Award: Basic coach education for beginner coaches for child, youth and adult players. **Scór:** Initiatives and activities in which GAA members engage to promote Irish music, dancing and culture. **Supertouch:** Small sided games for 13 to 18 year olds.

12: HISTORY OF CLONMORE GFC

The club as we know it today was founded in December 1947 but there were GAA clubs in the Hacketstown and Clonmore areas dating back to 1887. Hacketstown had its own team then, campaigning first under the name of "McMurrough Kavanaghs" (c1908) and later as "Mick McQuaids" and they played in both Carlow and Wicklow at different times. Clonmore also had a team as did Ballybrack, Crecrin and Ballyconnell.

Those clubs found success hard to come by, but there were some notable achievements:

- Crecrin Harps (Ballyconnell) lost by one point to Graiguecullen in the 1890 Carlow County Final.
- Ballybrack won the Wicklow Junior Championship in 1936.
- Mick McQuaids (Hacketstown) won the Carlow Junior Championship in 1922 and the Wicklow Minor C'ship in 1942.

Dr Cullen Park is called after the former Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, Dr Matthew Cullen (1864-1936), a native of Hacketstown and uncle of our Hon. President, Denis. Bishop Cullen was a strong supporter of the GAA in its early years.

In the mid-1940s, hurling was the dominant game in Hacketstown and under the guidance of Kilkenny man, Fr Tom O'Donnell, Hacketstown won the Carlow Senior Hurling Championship in 1947.

A number of players in the area were keen to play football and in late 1947, a group of men led by local publican Larry Kenny approached the curate in Clonmore, Fr Paul Maher, to form a GAA club. Fr Maher, a Laois man, jumped at the idea but said it would have to be a hurling club, to which Larry replied "if you put hurleys in these boys hands, we won't have fifteen left for any sort of team".

So began the story of Clonmore GFC, with the backing of the priest and the publican, and an enthusiastic group including Chairman, Dan Donohue, Secretary, Michael Donohue, Mick Connolly, John J Doyle, Jim Keogh & Jim Doyle (Clonmore). Jim Keogh went from house to house collecting shillings and half-crowns to buy a set of jerseys. The club now has its own grounds with dressing rooms, gym, floodlightsand several sets of jerseys. From little acorns grow mighty oaks.

The Fifties:

With the amount of football talent in the area, Clonmore did not have long to wait for success and in 1950, the club won its first honour, a County Junior Championship against Bagenalstown, on an atrocious wet day "when the only safe pair of hands were those of Paks Connolly". This victory elevated Clonmore into Senior ranks and heralded a golden age for the club with two Senior Championships (55 & 56), two League titles (56 & 57) and SFC Final appearances in 1958, 63 & 65.

The Clonmore team of the fifties is regarded as one of the finest club teams ever to play in Carlow. The "Big 5" of the team – Paks Connolly, Martin Molloy, Jim Fogarty, Mick Connolly and Denis Cullen – were regulars on the county team at a time when Carlow were one of the top teams in the country. Paks Connolly and Martin Molloy played for Leinster. Paks was one of the best players ever to play for Carlow and was centre-back on the Carlow teams that reached the NFL Final in 1954 and semi-final in 1962. In a match report on Carlow's NFL win over Kildare in March 1962, the Nationalist stated "Carlow's man-of-the-match, Paks Connolly, strode the pitch like a colossus.....". Ní bheidh a leithead ann arís.

Sixties & Seventies:

Clonmore continued to be one of the top teams in Carlow in the early sixties reaching the County Senior Finals in 1963 and 65, where we lost to Tullow and Eire Og. Clonmore defeated Ballinabranna in the County Minor Final in 1962 only to lose the Championship on an objection.

There followed a barren spell in the late sixties and seventies in spite of continuing to compete at Senior level and producing some fine county players such as Tom Kehoe, Tom Boland and Tommy Purser.

A significant landmark for the club was the purchase of the current playing pitch at Woodside from the Land Commission for £1,000 in 1968, a deal brokered by Chairman, Fr Bernard Ryan, and Secretary, JJ Doyle. The club had originally played at Kinsella's field (Clonmore) before moving to Cullen's (Vermount), Hill's (Hacketstown), Connolly's (Eagle Hill), Whelan's (the Moate) and Tallon's (The Curragh).

Clonmore reached U-21 finals in 1976 and 78 and won SFL Div 2 titles in 1974, 77 and 81. But the club was struggling in the Senior Championship and in 1979, the decision was made to drop down from Senior for the first time since 1950. Under the inspirational leadership of Chairman, Sean O'Toole, the team bounced straight back up by winning the Intermediate Championship in 1980.

Regulars on county teams during the 70s were Frank Donnelly, Tony Kelly, Liam Butler, Mick Byrne & Jimmy Lawlor and in the 80s - Larry O'Brien, Kevin Tallon, Mick Doyle, Jim Bolger and John Kennedy, the latter two played on the Carlow U-21 team beaten by one point by Dublin in the 1984 Leinster Final.

Eighties & Nineties:

In 1981, a history of the club entitled "Our Sporting Heritage", written by Jack Byrne and Jim Doyle (Water St) was published. In 1984, the Centenary Year of the GAA, the current club house was built at a cost of £17,000 and opened in December of that year by GAA President, Mr Paddy Buggy.

Following the founding of a Juvenile club and some outstanding work with underage teams, there followed another "golden era" in the late 1980s and early 1990s. In 1987, Clonmore's U-21s played out an epic three game battle with Eire Og in the County Final before going down fighting in the second replay. Undeterred, Clonmore fought back to win the club's first U-21 and Minor Championships in 1991 and won the Minor Championship again in 1992.

This fine group of players went on to win the Intermediate Championship in 1994 and reach the Senior Championship semi-finals in 1997 and 2001 and the 2000 League final.

While this team didn't manage to make it to a Senior final, they were consistently one of the top four teams in the county, beating the reigning Leinster Club Champions on two occasions - Eire Og in a Div 1 game at Páirc Uí Bhriain in May 1993 and O'Hanrahans in the 2000 League semi-final in Tullow.

Thomas Doyle and Philip Cullen were on the Carlow panel that won the All-Ireland "B" title in 1994.

The new century - 2000 on

The new century has heralded major developments at the club grounds with the pitch being levelled, improvements to the dressing rooms and showers, a gym installed, floodlights erected and an adjoining field purchased. In 2005, the Club launched a Five Year Plan for the Juvenile Club entitled "An Tosach Nua".

On the field, Clonmore continued to compete with hope and fervour. The century started with narrow defeats in the 2000 League final by Eire Og, the 2001 Championship semi-final by Palatine and the 2005 All County League final by Kildavin. After dropping from Senior to Intermediate ranks in 2006, the Intermediate teams have put in a huge effort to regain our Senior status, reaching the semi-final in 2006 and 2013 and the final in 2007, 2008 and 2011. The Minors were unlucky to lose the 2008 A Championship semi-final by one point to Eire Og but did win the B Championship in 2011 and reached the B final again in 2013.

On the county scene, Peter Kiernan, John McGrath and Paudge McGrath were involved when Carlow won the O'Byrne Cup in 2001, Con Murphy and Paddy Gahan were in the Minor panel that reached the 2007 Leinster Final, while Con, Johnny Doyle, Bobby Rooney, David Mulvany and Shane McGrath have played for the county



senior team. 2011 was a good year for the club. We won three cups – the Minor B Championship, Division 2 and Division 4 Leagues while the U-21s reached the B Final. In 2012 the Intermediates won Div 2 and the U-21s lost narrowly to O'Hanrahan's in the B Final. In 2013, we reached the U-21 and Minor B championship finals but neither team got the bit of luck that would have turned defeat into victory. The Intermediates played some great football in 2013 but did not do themselves justice in the semi-final against Ballinabranna.

After contesting the Minor and U-21 finals in 2013, and with a vibrant Juvenile club producing an abundance of footballing talent, the future of Clonmore GFC looks assured.

What has changed in the community over the years and impact on the Club

Since the foundation of the club in 1947, the population in the Hacketstown/Clonmore areas has increased due to additional housing in the locality, but neighbouring clubs such as Rathvilly, Kiltegan and Coolkenno have also grown and become more successful resulting in a smaller geographical area for Clonmore to pick from compared with the early years of the club.

Employment opportunities nationally and locally have fallen, resulting in a lot of players having to leave the area and in some cases to emigrate. The numbers of players who go on to third level education has also increased and can result in commuting problems for players when it comes to training and matches.

Both schools in Hacketstown have been refurbished and provided with much improved sporting facilities in recent years and there are teachers in both schools who actively promote Gaelic games which is very positive. Coláiste Eoin has enjoyed success in recent years, winning the South Leinster "C" Championship in 2013 under the guidance of Darragh Kelly and Barry Doogue, while Hacketstown National School won the Cumann na Bhunscoil blitz in 2013 coached by Barry Murphy and Gabriel Keane. We are probably not getting as many players from Ballyconnell and Tynock schools as we did in the early years as they are more closely aligned to Coolkenno and Kiltegan GAA clubs nowadays.

The growth in popularity of other sports such as soccer and rugby means that Clonmore GFC now has to work harder to promote itself and make the GAA attractive to our young people. Likewise, we must sell our games in a professional manner to children who have grown up in the age of technology and we must try to make playing sport an attractive alternative to playing computer games. Alcohol and substance abuse is a big issue in modern society and Clonmore GFC, like all sporting organisations, is doing its best to promote a healthy lifestyle.

While we do face some serious challenges, the club continues to be central to the community and participation levels at both playing and administration levels have never been higher. Silverware is not as plentiful as we would like but Clonmore still competes very well at all grades and to field our own teams. In recent years we have consistently reached finals and semi-finals at Intermediate, U-21 and Minor levels and with the Juvenile club going from strength to strength, the long term future of the club looks secure.

The facilities Clonmore GFC has in place:

- One full size playing pitch with match standard floodlights
- One juvenile pitch with training lights
- One training field large enough to be developed into full sized playing pitch
- Clubhouse with two dressing rooms, showers, meeting room and gymnasium
- Two player's dugouts and one supporter's shelter
- Generator house and equipment storage cages
- Large car park
- Children's playground (in development)


