T. JOHN'S GAA

Philosophy

At St. John's GAA Club, our coaching philosophy centres around "FUN, RESPECT, MANNERS, COMMITMENT & DEVELOPMENT."

By signing your registration form or checking the acceptance box in the online registration you are accepting the Club Rules/Terms and Conditions. In addition, you agree to and are aware of the following:

Young players should be entitled to:

- Be safe and feel safe.
- Have fun and experience a sense of enjoyment and fulfilment.
- Be treated with respect, dignity and sensitivity.
- Comment and make suggestions in a constructive manner.
- Be afforded appropriate confidentiality.
- Participate in games and competitions at a level at which they feel comfortable.
- Be listened to.
- Make their concerns known and have them dealt with in an appropriate manner.
- Be protected from abuse.

Code of Conduct for Players

Young players should always:

- Play fairly, do their best and enjoy themselves.
- Respect fellow team members regardless of ability, ethnic origin, cultural background
- or religion.
- Support fellow team members whether they do well or not so well.
- Represent their team, their club and their family with pride and dignity.
- Respect all coaches, mentors, officials and their opponents.
- Be gracious in defeat and modest in victory.
- Shake hands before and after the game irrespective of the result.
- Inform their coach/mentor/manager when they are unavailable for training and games.
- Talk to the Club Children's Officer with any concerns or questions they may have.
- Adhere to acceptable standards of behaviour and have good manners.
- Tell somebody else if they or others have been harmed in any way.

Take due care of club equipment.



Young players should not:

- Cheat always play by the rules.
- Shout at or argue with an official, team mates or opponents or use violence.
- Use unfair or bullying tactics to gain advantage or isolate other players.
- Spread rumours.
- Tell lies about adults or other young people.
- Play or train if they feel unwell or are injured.
- Use unacceptable language or racial and/or sectarian references.
- Record or use mobile phones in dressing rooms.
- Send images via mobile data of players/coaches/club members.
- Intimidate or undermine a person's character nor defame any person.

Code of Conduct for Parents/Guardians


Parents/Guardians have an influential role to play in assisting and encouraging their children to adopt a positive attitude and in encouraging them to maintain an involvement in sport. They should always be good role models for their children.

Parents/Guardians should encourage their child to:

- Play by the rules.
- Improve their skills levels.
- Appreciate everybody on their team regardless of ability.
- Maintain a balanced and healthy lifestyle with regard to exercise, food, rest and play.
- Seek advice if necessary from club officials on any of these issues.

Parents / Guardians should:

- Lead by example
- Respect officials' decisions and encourage children to do likewise.
- Respect the Coaching philosophy of the club.
- Be realistic in their expectations.
- Show approval for effort, not just results.
- Complete and return the registration/permission forms for their child's participation in the club.
- Inform the mentors of any change in their child's medical or dietary requirements prior to coaching sessions, games or other activities.
- Ensure that their child punctually attends coaching sessions/games or other activities. Provide their child with proper clothing and equipment.
- Ensure that the nutrition/hydration and hygiene needs of their child are met.



- Listen to what young people have to say.
- Show approval whether the team wins, loses or draws a game.
- Applaud good play from all teams.
- Identify how improvements may be made.

Parents / Guardians should not:

- Exert undue pressure on your child.
- Admonish your own child or any other child for their standard of play.
- Embarrass a child or use sarcastic remarks towards a player.
- Criticise playing performances.
- Seek to unfairly affect a game or player.
- Enter the field of play or play area unless invited to do so by an official in charge.
- Attempt to meet their own needs and aspirations for success and achievement through their children's participation in games.

Parents / Guardians should assist their club by:

- Showing appreciation to volunteers, mentors and club officials.
- Attending training and games on a regular basis.
- Assisting in the organising of club activities and events as requested.
- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every person and treat each one equally regardless of age, gender, ability, ethnic origin, cultural background or religion.

Parents / Guardians have the right to:

- Know their child is safe and to make a complaint if they believe that their child's safety is in any way compromised.
- Be informed of problems/concerns relating to their child.
- Be informed if their child gets injured.
- Complain if they have concerns about the standard of coaching.
- Have a say in relation to decisions being made within the club.

If any parent / guardian has a concern about a player or wishes to make a complaint, they may do so via our respective children's officers.
